COURSE OVERVIEW

The 38th Annual Southeastern Consortium for Dermatology: What's Old is New is designed to provide academic, general, surgical and community-based dermatology physicians, physician's assistants, and nurse practitioners an opportunity to learn about and discuss the advances in the diagnosis and treatment of patients with skin disease. Practice gaps to be addressed include medical treatment of skin disease, infectious diseases of the skin, and cutaneous oncology. Presenters across multiple disciplines will describe a complete approach to patient care. Participants will gain knowledge and skills that, when applied in practice, will support improvement in outcomes in their patients.

EDUCATIONAL OBIECTIVES

At the conclusion of the *What's Old is New* session, the participant should be able to:

- State the latest advances and applications of antimalarial medications for dermatologic conditions.
- Discuss the uses of sulfur-based medications in the treatment of common skin conditions including demodex.
- Effectively use dapsone, potassium iodide, coal tar, and vioform in the treatment of dermatology patients.
- Understand updated treatment strategies to effectively manage the patient with ichthyosis.

At the conclusion of the *Infectious Diseases in Dermatology* session, the participant should be able to:

- Recognize and utilize the most effective therapy for common fungal infections.
- Understand the approach and updated treatment strategies for Leishmaniasis.
- Recognize and effectively manage common cutaneous manifestations in patients with HIV.

At the conclusion of the *Cutaneous Oncology* session, the participant should be able to:

- Understand updated treatment strategies for common cutaneous malignancies including basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma, and melanoma.
- Recognize the appropriate use criteria for Mohs surgery.
- Understand the role of photodynamic therapy for treatment of non-melanoma skin cancer.

2014 SEC Poster Guidelines

- 1. Guidelines for the Submission of Posters
 - a. Posters should be as informative as possible. State the specific objective of the study, the method used, the results, and the conclusion.
 - b. Abstracts must be typed directly on the Official Abstract Form. Accepted abstracts will be included in the Program Book and the SEC official web site.
 - c. The entire abstract, including title, author(s)/presenters, institutions, and sponsorships should not exceed 200 words.
 - d. All information must be typed in English. Single-space all typing. If possible, use typing font Arial 12.
 - e. Standard abbreviations may be used. Explain nonstandard abbreviations in parentheses when first used.
 - f. On the first line, type the title of the abstract in capital letters flush with the left margin of the block.
 - g. On the next line, include the full names of all authors and their institutional affiliations, cities, states, and countries (if outside the United States). End the abstract with acknowledgements, if any.
 - h. Submit the abstract text electronically via email.
 - i. All financial relationships and disclosures should be clearly displayed on your poster.
 - j. Only generic/scientific names should be used for drugs, devices and/or instrumentation. Trade names should not be used.
- 2. Judging criteria (15 points maximum)
 - Educational value- Posters should present new ideas and original observations worthy of sharing with attendees to the Southeastern Consortium annual meeting. (5 points)
 - b. Clinical relevance- Information presented should have clear bearing on the practice of clinical dermatology. (5 points)
 - c. Presentation- Posters should be well organized and thought out. Clarity and conciseness are key. (5 points)
- 3. Prizes: awarded to the first author but presumed to be shared with all authors of the poster
 - a. First place \$250
 - b. Second place \$150
 - c. Third place \$100
