At the end of this program, participants will be able to: describe techniques of stress reduction and physical, emotional, and self-care; list strategies for processing grief and supporting themselves and others in the grief process; describe a framework to discuss the awe and mystery of medicine, particularly in end-of-life care; and examine service as a way of life.
